IRREGULAR MIGRATION OF YOUNG WOMEN.

The negative effects of irregular migration of young women can never be underscored, as it has become a major societal challenge and modern day slavery that maybe very difficult to curb.

Irregular migration can be defined as the movement of persons to a new place of residence or transit that takes place outside the regulatory norms of the sending, transit and receiving countries. It can also be viewed as migrants moving through irregular means.

According to United Nations Population Division, about 49% of all international migrants as at 2000 were women or girls. However, the percentage of women involved in international migration had reached 51% in more developed nations.

Presently, the number of women who are travelling as migrant workers or moving on their own as principal wage earners has increased. Most women migrants migrate voluntarily but there are still cases of female folks who are pushed to leave their nations so as to escape from conflicts, persecution, ecological problems, natural mishaps and/or some other circumstances, which impinge on their survival. However, emigration in the recent time has diverted to different parts of the world particularly Europe. The current trend is usually concealed, involving high level of risk trying to pass through different transit routes like Libya to get to Italy through Sahara desert and the Mediterrean Sea. Most young female emigrants are usually stranded in places like Algeria, Libya, Senegal, and Morocco for many months or even years. Some are jailed in those places, others die on their way through the perilous desert or the sea.

A great number of young girls are willing to migrate abroad illegally in spite of the fact that they are aware of the various challenges that face them overseas. Again, lack of knowledge of the modern-day slave trade as evident in Libya has made them to migrate without much care. It can therefore be said that the greatest problem confronting young female migrants today is the issue of being sold into slavery, forced into unpaid labor/prostitution and being forced to donate their vital organs.



Asides poverty, many other factors have been attributed to be the reasons why people embark on this life threatening journey, they include ;

- Peer pressure
- Insecurity
- Political instability
- · Poor standard of living
- Bad Government policies
- Unemployment
- High illiteracy level
- Harsh Economic conditions e.t.c

Below are some of the things to do to ensure that the issue of irregular migration is reduced to the minimal.

- Proper sensitization/enlightenment of women on what irregular migration is all about.
- Improved standard of living
- Job creation
- Community dialogue with young women to broaden their knowledge on the dangers of irregular migration.
- · More advocacy visits to rural communities
- The Government should put up policies that can help to eliminate poverty.

Youths are likely to make themselves available for voluntary slavery due to increasing rate of poverty which is the foundation for modernday slavery, there is a significant correlation between poverty, youth migration and modern-day slavery. While poverty pushes youths to migrate, their migration prepares the ground for the modern-slave trade.

When one deals with generalized insecurity for a long period of time, the doubt and negative feelings experienced may have a significant effect on the person's life. Women in the South-East region have been playing significant roles in curbing insecurity in the zone, despite cultural, religious, and demographic challenges facing them. They are also the most affected by these uncertainties.

In the light of this, WEPBI organized a 3-Day Training for community women at Amokwe in Udi L.G.A , Ndeagbor in Awgu L.G.A and Ikpamodo in Igbo-Eze North L.G.A respectively .

The training which was geared towards educating them on the insecurities ravaging their various communities, was tagged 'Early Warning Systems to Reduce Community Vulnerabilities and Improve Preparedness in Addressing Insecurity'. The event was attended by the women from the aforementioned communities , where they were trained on how to identify potential security threat in their environs and how they can take preventive measures to see that those security threats are tackled from an early stage.


