WHEN SAFETY FADES: THE CRISIS OF WOMEN AND INSECURITY IN BENUE AND ENUGU



Insecurity in Nigeria continues to evolve in complex and deeply troubling ways, with women and girls among the most vulnerable and affected. Across the country, but particularly in states like Benue and Enugu, the impact of violence and instability is felt most profoundly in the lives of women who face displacement, loss, trauma, and violence, often with limited institutional protection or support.

In Benue State, the persistent farmer-herder conflicts have resulted in widespread displacement and human suffering. Women in agrarian communities have not only lost access to their farmlands but have also been forced to flee with their children, leaving behind homes and livelihoods.

These violent clashes have torn families apart and rendered many women widows and single providers overnight. As they take refuge in Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) camps, their vulnerability only deepens. In these camps, access to basic healthcare, reproductive services, education, and economic support is limited, and the threat of gender-based violence is ever-present. The breakdown of community structures and traditional support systems further isolates women, making it even harder for them to rebuild their lives or access justice.

While Enugu State does not face the same scale of armed conflict, it has been grappling with a disturbing rise in ritual killings, especially targeting women and young girls. These gruesome acts are often driven by the growing get-rich-quick syndrome among young men, fueled by superstition, desperation, and a lack of economic opportunity. Many of these cases go unreported due to fear, stigma, or lack of faith in law enforcement, and in some communities, women now live in fear of simply walking alone. Unlike in Benue, where women suffer from large-scale displacement, the insecurity in Enugu is more insidious, occurring within urban and peri-urban settings, yet no less devastating in its consequences.

Women in both Benue and Enugu remain largely excluded from peacebuilding and security decisions, despite being deeply affected by the violence. Their absence from formal processes silences valuable perspectives and limits effective community responses.

To effectively address insecurity, women should be recognized as key contributors to peacebuilding, with their insights vital for community security. Inclusive, gender-sensitive approaches that empower women as active agents are crucial for lasting peace.
